# **Terry Worrall remembers – Part One**

Trust member Terry Worrall retired in 2015 after a long and successful career on the railway both at home and abroad. Since then he has been recording his memories for the benefit of his family. Terry was brought up in Luton, went to Luton Grammar School, was a keen trainspotter and in 1961 joined British Railways at St Pancras moving to St Albans in 1963. He has very kindly given us access to his recollections of these early days and the first part appears below.

In July 1963 I applied for the Class 3 Station Master's Clerk job at St Albans – not a mind stretching position, but one that allowed me to learn about Paybills, Rostering and Cost Centre budgets (then in their infancy at station level!).

I was interviewed and then selected by the Station Master, Ken Bonwick, who had been a Traffic Apprentice (TA) some years earlier and had been at St Albans for two years. I had aspirations to be a TA and hoped that I could learn from him – he moved on about 4 weeks after I started, so that put paid to my 'knowledge transfer' expectation!

I took up my new post in August 1963 (at a salary of £655 per annum which, with overtime, subsequently averaged £1000+ p.a. whilst I worked there) and started by sharing an office within the old Midland Railway station building alongside the Down fast platform with Luke Parsons, the Chief Parcels Clerk (Class 2) and a lady

Parcels Clerk, Class 3. Luke was a bundle of fun –late 50s, but the lady, a late 30s spinster, was very formal, 'prim and proper' and not used to dealing with 18 year olds like me or Luke – she tolerated both of us! There was always plenty of opportunity for overtime especially in the City Booking Office – a 'temporary' portakabin type building under the canopy in the Station forecourt on the Down side of the station.

# **Progress at the 'box**

Nonetheless, with suitable signing in, sanitising hands and distancing, we managed to do some work at the 'box, even if it was a bit disjointed due to Covid, the festive season and the weather. However, some home-working took over instead, and John W did display our Christmas lights on the lawn.

David, Richard and myself managed to complete the roadside hedge clear-down, limited at times with only three green wheelies! Clearing the flowerbeds and leaves was also completed. In the absence of a railhead treatment train, Tony cleared leaves off the model railway tracks by manual broom-head treatment – snow clearing to follow! He also freed the sticking upstairs door lock with a file! John W continues homeworking on the tops of our two latest lamp post acquisitions; while Michael home-prepared some wooden planks, in order to repair the lawn bench when the weather improves. Martin hopes to finish restoring the gradient post, now removed to the lawn hedge-line.

A number of other tasks are also held over until Spring appears, including the 'bull' that will be required to prepare for eventual re-opening – whenever that might be!

The £5m Station re-vamp is now finished, including an attractive new Illuminated sign over the main entrance. The second footbridge is next, but currently all the improvements to cope with increased passenger levels, including the convenience store, seem to be white elephants! Most of the long-lying discarded rails outside the 'box, have finally been removed.

Our foxes under the 'box made a return, but have now disappeared again. Local cats and the 'box robin are ever-evident, and we hope our blue tits will return to one of the nesting boxes. Wildlife doesn't seem to be put off by train noise!
