City Station celebrates 50 years of change

15th of May this year marked 50 years since the new booking hall on the up side was opened. To mark the occasion there was a ceremony to unveil by the gate line the replica *City of St Albans* locomotive nameplate (that had been on display previously in the signal box) and a large image of the locomotive created by artist Richard Green. Representatives of the Trust, Govia Thameslink, Network Rail, Beds & Herts Community Rail Partnership and St Albans BID were present and the Mayor, Geoff Harrison, performed part of the unveiling. Also present was the St Albans MP Daisy Cooper and Siggy Cragwell who is the oldest employee of GTR. Later Siggy along with Trust Chairman John Telford formally opened a photographic exhibition in the empty retail unit on Platform 4. This shows views of the old pre-1973 station and has been collated by the Trust. After the ceremonies, those present moved on to the signal box where a celebration cake was cut and served and visitors were shown around. There was good publicity subsequently in the local media although, sadly, nothing in the railway press.

Midland Railway signal boxes operating on Network Rail

Over 40 years since St Albans South signal box ceased operating, there are still some Midland Railway (MR) signal boxes working on the national network today. In particular, I recently joined a visit to boxes on the Leicester to Peterborough line, including Langham Junction and Oakham.

Langham Junction is contemporary with St Albans, being built 2 years earlier in 1890, and is looking quite smart, albeit with the inevitable replacement windows. It has it's original MR tumbler-locking lever frame, and quite remarkably has the original brass lever number and description plates – these are small plates, no bigger than the lever thickness and are mounted on the side of the levers; I imagine that they are quite sought after by collectors. Equally remarkably, Network Rail have provided new brass plates to match, where changes have been necessary.

By the time our lever frame was replaced in 1906, the MR practice had changed to larger lever number plates and brass description plates mounted behind the levers. And, of course, changes over the years using the style of the day, has left us in our box with a complete hotchpotch of plates.

The next box along the line from Langham Junction is Oakham Level Crossing, of iconic Airfix-kit fame. This is a listed building and as such it's new windows are of a sympathetic MR style including the triangular corner pieces. And, together with the wooden stairs and fire buckets, this enables it to retain a classical appearance. **Rob Little**
